# **Writing Assignments**

In this semester the student will be assigned one analysis paper pertaining to a significant event in world history. This assignment will access the students' ability to apply historical thinking skills to a particular subject.

#### **Class Participation**

It is imperative that students participate in class discussions each and every class meeting. I welcome dissenting views, comments, and I will expect students to discuss their ideas and interpretations of the assigned materials for each class. Students will also be assigned to groups and are expected to participate in discussions.

#### In Class Notes

Students in this course will be required to take notes during lectures. These notes will be taken on a 5-subject spiral notebook every day. These notes will be kept in class and used in recording specific points during lectures, class and group discussions. We will use the Cornell style of note-taking which we will review together before the course commences. Furthermore in class worksheets, maps and other handouts will need to be glued into your note books. These notes at certain intervals during the course maybe used for open notes tests or quizzes. But more importantly, the consistent note taking will increase the students writing, organization and discerning abilities.

#### **Quizzes**

Weekly quizzes will be given to gauge the students' comprehension of the course material.
